Open Night

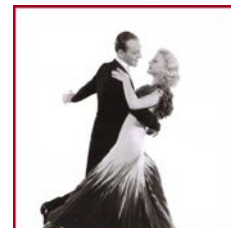

Education Week May 19-24

This year, Education Week will run from Monday 20 to Friday 24 May with the theme of ‘Celebrating Careers’. (See flyer on following page.) We will be running various career activities for all year levels throughout the week to expand students’ knowledge of various vocational pathways. There will be an emphasis on investigating careers of the future in this ever changing world and another focus will be on ‘Get Vet’, a program that highlights the many advantages of undertaking VET in VCE & VCAL.

One of the biggest challenges for a young person is how and where to commence the career journey. Our Year 9 students will travel to SWTAFE in Warrnambool to explore the courses they have on offer. The SWTAFE ‘Try a Career’ Expo gives the opportunity for young people to try ‘hands on activities’ and talk to people about what is involved in a range of different careers. This is also your opportunity to find out more about VETis (Vocational Education and Training in Schools).

Our career adviser, Annette Hickey, is always available to talk to parents about their child’s career pathway, phone the office to have a chat with her or make an appointment to visit the school.

Morrisby Online – An online career discovery tool for all our Year 9 students.(Term 3)



The Department of Education and Training is supporting all secondary schools to provide comprehensive career education from Year 7. This includes a new, free, career advisory service for Year 9 students.

The service is designed to help students make better choices about subject selection, vocational education and training, senior secondary school certificates and further study.

CTS will have access to:

- an online personal career discovery tool that identifies potential suitable careers in a report
- analysis of their career assessment report by an accredited career practitioner
- follow-up one-on-one career counselling to progress their choice to reality.

The service uses a personal online career discovery tool (Morrisby Online) which provides objective and relevant information about the student and the opportunities available. Once the assessment has been completed the student will be provided with a report and a 1:1 career counselling session. This will be conducted by a qualified career practitioner during school hours at school, with parents encouraged to attend. Discussions will include short-term specific subject choices as well as training, higher education and employment pathways and will inform the career action plan the student completes at school.

The student is provided with a ‘Log in for life’ to the career discovery tool. Students are able to revisit the tool across the remainder of their school life (and beyond) to complete additional assessments and undertake research in new areas of interest.

NAPLAN 2019

The National Assessment Program in Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is moving to an online environment this year. Year 7 and 9 students will participate in tests of Writing, Reading, the Conventions of Language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy across Tuesday 14 to Friday 17 May (Week 4 of Term 2). Catch up sessions for students absent on the day of any of the tests will be conducted in the following week.

What do we learn from NAPLAN testing?

NAPLAN testing provides a snapshot of your child's achievement at one particular point in time. This information provides some specific information that adds to the total picture of achievement for your child. As a school, we are able to analyse the whole Year level data sets to identify common areas of difficulty and/or misunderstanding. We also get a general idea about the learning growth of the student cohort since their previous NAPLAN tests. This information is useful as we examine the effectiveness of our teaching and learning programs, and plan for school improvement.

All students are expected to participate in the NAPLAN tests. Support can be arranged for students with a range of needs that would impact on their ability to complete the tests. We now have flexibility to more easily provide additional time for those that may require it to complete the tests, but this must be set up before the testing starts. Exemptions may also be granted to students with significant intellectual disabilities.

If you feel that your child would benefit from some additional support during the tests, or is eligible for support due to specific learning needs, you need to discuss this with Michael Smart before **Friday 10 May**. Likewise, if you feel that due to the nature of your child's specific learning needs or disability, you would like them exempted from the NAPLAN test, you need to discuss this with Michael Smart before **Friday 10 May**. Parental consent is required before any support due to disability, or an exemption, is granted.

Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer. This is a matter for consideration by parents and carers in consultation with the principal or NAPLAN coordinator. **If, after consultation, you decide to withdraw your child, you must sign a Student Withdrawal form by Friday 10 May.** These forms are generated on a need basis, so please contact Michael Smart to plan for your child's withdrawal.

Naturally, as a school, we would like every student in Years 7 to 9 to attempt the NAPLAN tests, including any struggling learners. The Education Department uses data from NAPLAN to provide targeted support to schools for learners identified as being significantly behind their age expected performance. If students would benefit from additional learning support, it is important that they complete NAPLAN testing so that their needs can be identified, and Department resources made available to support their improved learning.

If you have any questions or concerns, please contact the NAPLAN coordinator, Michael Smart, to discuss your child's participation in NAPLAN.

Later in the year all families that had students involved in NAPLAN testing will receive a personal NAPLAN report. The report will describe your child's particular skills in Reading, Writing, the Conventions of Language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy. The report will also show how your child performed in relation to national minimum standards. These describe the minimum acceptable standards for students across Australia.

I am confident that the information you receive as a result of your child's participation in the NAPLAN tests will be valuable in helping you to assess your child's progress in literacy and numeracy.

Cybersafety at home

Does your child use technology at home?

Do you know which technologies they use and what they use them for?

Do you have limits in place and supervise and support your child's online life, as you would their offline world?

Do you have a set of rules or a family agreement for technology use at home?

Technology such as mobile phones, personal computers, tablets and gaming devices has become part of life in almost every Australian household. Along with providing many advantages, new technology also raises significant challenges and concerns, such as cyberbullying, the need to protect privacy, too much time spent using technology, and children accessing offensive, inappropriate or illegal content. Parents can manage these challenges and support their children's cybersafety by providing boundaries, guidance, support, encouragement and care.

Cyberbullying

Cyberbullying is using technology to intimidate, harass or bully an individual or group, for example by sending abusive texts or emails, excluding them or posting hurtful messages, pictures or videos. Young people experiencing cyberbullying may not tell their parents due to fear that they will overreact or remove their technology access.

- Talk with your child about relating respectfully and responsibly online.
- Encourage your child to talk to you about any concerns they have, including any upsetting online experiences. Reassure them that you will not remove their access to technology if they report concerns to you.
- If your child is the target of cyberbullying, support them to take actions to address it, such as blocking abusive contacts, reporting the incidents to service providers, the school or police, and talking to the parents of young people involved.

Protecting privacy

Many online activities – including social networking and instant messaging – involve sharing personal information. But disclosing personal information – such as full names, addresses, phone numbers, family members' names, school, bank details, usernames and passwords – can threaten a young person's safety and wellbeing. In addition, young people can easily and quickly create and share content, including photographs or videos of themselves or others that are inappropriately personal and which may affect their social and emotional wellbeing or reputation.

- Talk about protecting privacy with your child.
- Activate privacy settings: for example, on mobile phones, social networking accounts, and email accounts.
- Establish an agreement about what your child shares online and what they keep private.

Too much time using technology

For many young people – and adults – using technology is part of day-to-day life. While technology use offers many positive opportunities, too much use can negatively affect a child's health, schoolwork and relationships. Excessive time online may be related to engagement in a particular type of technology use, such as social networking, gaming or pornography. A child with high levels of use may or may not consider their use excessive.

- Talk with your child about their use and any concerns you have about its impact.
- Set limits on time spent using technology.
- Keep technology out of children's bedrooms.
- Support your child to develop a healthy balance of online and offline activities, including physical activities and engaging with family and friends in-person.
- If you have ongoing difficulties with excessive use that is negatively affecting your child's wellbeing, seek professional support.

Accessing offensive, inappropriate or illegal content

Technology provides access to a vast amount of material from all around the world. Unfortunately, some of that material is offensive, illegal or otherwise inappropriate for young people. For example: images of violence, material that promotes hate towards individuals or groups, pornography – including extreme and violent sexual imagery, images of child sexual abuse, gambling, instructions for crime or violence, and material that promotes harm such as eating disorders or self-harm. Young people may seek out this kind of material or come across it accidentally.

- Talk with your child about the risk of accessing offensive, inappropriate or illegal material and why it is unhealthy for them to access it.
- Set limits on your child's technology use. For example, have them use it only in shared spaces in the home.
- Encourage your child to talk to you if they come across something that concerns or upsets them.
- Use parental controls to manage technology in your household.

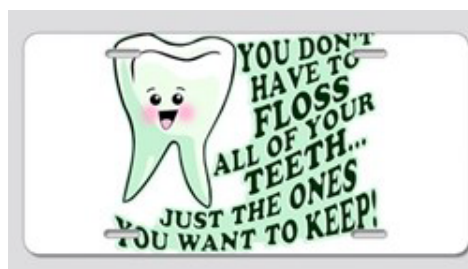

Road Smart is coming to Cobden Technical School

Week 5 - Tuesday 21st May Session 1&2

What is Road Smart?

Road Smart is a road safety education and training program for year 10 students (or equivalent) which is replaced Keys Please in 2018. The program will be delivered statewide and is an initiative of the Victorian State Government's Young Driver Safety Package.

Why are you focussing on Year 10 students/beginner drivers?

The Road Smart program is best suited to the transition from pre-learner to learner driver, which closely aligns with the age of many Year 10 students. Research carried out in the initial stages of the project confirmed that there is a need to better support young people who are looking to become learner drivers. This work also identified that supervising drivers require extra support at this transition point and more generally.

What does the program cost?

The Road Smart program is free for schools, as it is funded by the Victorian Government.

What is the Young Driver Safety Package (YDSP)?

The Victorian Government has committed to implement a plan to reduce further young driver crash rates through the development and delivery of five education and training initiatives. These initiatives, referred to as the YDSP will be put in place by either TAC or VicRoads.

The initiatives are:

- Road safety education complex (TAC)
- Practical safe driving program / Road Smart (VicRoads)
- Free licence scheme (VicRoads)
- L2P - learner driver mentor program (VicRoads)
- Youth grants, communication opportunities and forums (TAC)

PROGRAM DELIVERY


What is the delivery format?

Road Smart has four components with schools having a choice of how they carry out their In-car sessions.



- 1) **In-class:** an interactive classroom session delivered at school by an approved facilitator (70 minutes or a double period during school hours)
- 2) **In-car off-road:** a practical driving session with an approved driving instructor at an off-road facility. This option is available for both learner permit holders and pre-learners who do not yet have a learner permit (approx 1 hour plus travel time during school hours)
OR
- 2) **In-car on-road:** a practical one-on-one driving session with an approved driving instructor. NOTE Students will require a learner permit to participate in this option (approx 45 mins plus travel time outside school hours)
- 3) **E-learning modules:** two for students and one for their supervising drivers



Mentor Support

You will be given a free training course to help you in learning the skills, to guide you in your supporting role with your learner driver.

Our L2P Project Coordinator will match mentors to learners, to make sure they suit each other.

This will help make it a safe and rewarding time for the mentor and learner driver.

Our L2P Project Officer will keep in regular contact with you and the learner drivers to support you in your role.

Where does the Program Operate?

L2P program is based at Terang and Mortlake Health Services in Terang, but the car will be covering the whole Corangamite Shire.

Learner Drivers – do need help to get 120 hours of supervised driving experience?

Having a driver's licence is important for young people to get to:

- Further education and training such as TAFE and university
- Employment
- Sport, social life and family

Sometimes young people find it hard to access a supervising driver or a suitable car or both. If you need help we can assist you.

The L2P Program (learner to probationer) is funded by the TAC and managed by VicRoads and provides trained volunteer drivers to act as Supervising Drivers.

- We provide 7 free professional driving lessons **and**
- We provide volunteer Supervising Drivers to supervise your driving practice **and**
- It's free! You only need to pay for your learner permit, log book and drivers licence test (once you complete 120 hours of supervised driving).

What do you need?

- between 16 and 21 years of age and
- have a Victorian Learner Driver Permit and
- have a Victorian Learner Driver's log book and
- have trouble accessing a supervising driver or a suitable car or both for your driving practice sessions as a learner driver.

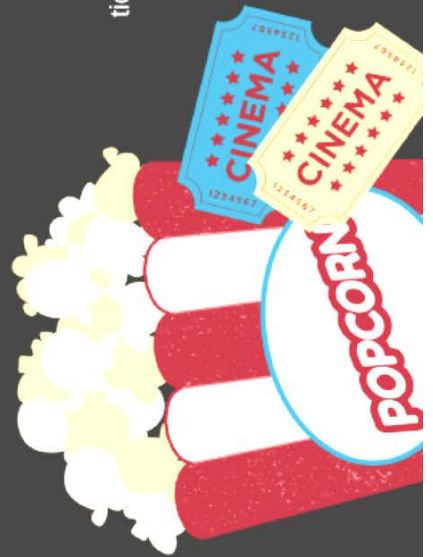

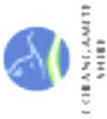
