FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2019, you do not need to complete an application form in 2020 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- **new student enrolments;** your child has started or changed schools in 2020 or you did not apply in 2019.
- **changed family circumstances;** such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2020.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.



From the Careers Room

Peter Rock, Careers and Work Education Coordinator

Welcome to the 2021 school year, from a careers and work education perspective. It has been my privilege to be given the responsibility of managing these programs for 2021, building on the enormous work of Annette Hickey over previous years; Annette and I will be working closely together in this area as she coordinates the VCAL and VCE programs for our school, including the SWL (Structured Workplace Learning) components of our senior school programs. Please feel free to contact me at school at any time...my office is in the Library.

Over the next few weeks, you will be able to access all manner of career-based resources from a designated link on our Cobden Technical School web page...more information about this in the next school newsletter...it will be wide-ranging and include information about:

- Labour market information
- Courses available at TAFE and Universities
- Careers interests tests
- Calendar of events (including tertiary open days)
- Careers newsletters
- And, much more.

I have commenced interviews with our Year 11 and 12 students and these will continue to ramp up over the next period of time, then extending to the Years 9 and 10 students.

The Careers Program at Cobden Technical School

This year, commencing in Term 2, we will be conducting introductory careers programs with our **Years 7 and 8** students. These programs will involve structured classroom activities with students working towards initial careers investigations so that they will be able to begin to think about planning a pathway for the future and making informed subject selection choices.

Starting at **Year 9**, all students are provided with thorough individual advice in Careers Pathway Investigation. From 2019, the Department of Education Victoria, in conjunction with the Careers Education Association of Victoria, introduced the Morrisby Career Discovery Program for all Year 9 students in Government Schools. This is a multi-staged program that concludes with a one-to-one interview with a Morrisby Careers Counsellor. Students use this information to complete a school Careers Assignment that links the Morrisby Program to subject selection for Year 10 to support them in reaching their goals. This will happen for our Year 9 students in Term 2...more information about this will be provided closer to the event. It will lead into one-to-one interviews with me to discuss their progress and aspirations for Year 10 and beyond.

In **Year 10**, all students complete the Work Experience Program during June. Experience in a workplace is linked to students graduating with higher employability skills and career awareness and, at Cobden Technical School, this program is compulsory. Year 10 students all participate in a one-to-one interview with me to discuss their progress and aspirations for Year 11 and beyond.

All students in Years 11 and 12 will be involved in a one-to-one interview with me over the first few weeks of the school year and I will liaise closely with the Senior School Coordinator, Sarah Cook, and VCAL/VET Coordinator, Annette Hickey, as to student pathways and progress.

VTAC Counselling

A little later in the year, at Year 12, all students are invited to one-to-one interviews to assist them through the tertiary application and employment pathway process. This includes scholarship and Special Entry Access Scheme application. Students can be assured of quality advice, help and confidentiality throughout this process, all the way through to tertiary offers and acceptance in 2022.

Interested in pursuing an apprenticeship or traineeship?

Even though you have just started the schooling year, your planning should start now. Australian Apprenticeship Pathways have developed an excellent four-step guide to assist you to start planning - <http://bit.ly/2E2R7T2>

We will certainly be doing a lot of work in this area over time, particularly in association with Westvic Staffing Solutions. But, there are lots of things you can do to be proactive in your planning.

Read through Step One and take the work type explorer quiz, download the AusAppPathways app to your phone, and complete practice aptitude quizzes to ascertain the level of literacy and numeracy skills you will need for different occupations.

You can also do the following during the year to prepare for an apprenticeship:

- Meet with me to start planning your professional trade career.
- Undertake work experience in several fields or with several employers in the same field. See me for information on how to organise work experience.
- Contact industry leaders and associations in your fields of interest to ask questions.
- Contact local apprenticeship centres and/or group training organisations to ask their advice on what makes a competitive apprenticeship applicant.

- Work hard in your English and Mathematics classes and VET/technology/science subjects if relevant. With advances in technology occurring across all apprenticeship fields, it will be crucial that you can read and interpret complex information and instructions, and adapt to changes in technology during your apprenticeship and once qualified.

VCE News

Welcome back to all students and it's wonderful to see and hear students engaged in many different learning activities and displaying great enthusiasm. All Year 11 and 12 students should now have settled into their pathway – VCE, VET and VCAL, and the electives offered within each pathway. We are very proud to be able to offer flexible pathways to ensure students get the best opportunity to meet their individual interests and future career aims. If there are any concerns they need to immediately talk to Mrs Cook or Mrs Hickey.

Most students should have been given schedules and assessment dates for their individual classes. They may also find these on Compass as learning tasks. It is important that students take notes of these dates and, if there are any questions, talk to their teachers. It is highly recommended that students have a diary to record important dates and parents may also assist by writing these on a family calendar.

It is imperative that if a student will be away, and they know prior to class, that they let their teachers know. It is a requirement that a student must be in attendance at least 80% of scheduled class time to satisfactorily complete each VCE unit. Therefore, if a student is absent due to a medical reason, a doctor's certificate is required to be handed in to the General Office. It is up to the students to ensure that they catch up on any missed work.

Year 12 students received their jumpers last week and look fantastic; a reminder that they still need to be in full school uniform and well done to those that have been doing so and being great role models for other students within the school.

On Mentor Interview Day, students were also briefed about the CTS Student Driving Policy. Students will need to sign the agreement form, along with their parent/guardian, and students must fill in details of their vehicle. If students will be transporting another student to school, they are required to fill in a separate section alongside their own parent/guardian and the other student's parent/guardian. These forms will be in the Year 12 Room for them to obtain and fill in if they intend on driving to/from school once they get their licence.

This year we have numerous students completing a distance education class, now known as Virtual School Victoria or VSV. These students are required to sign into the library each session. I am also the school-based coordinator if students have any problems and need any extra support; please make sure they make contact with myself and their VSV teacher. All students should now have computer access to the online system and assessment details and schedules.

The Senior School team look forward to a fantastic year ahead. Please email or call at any time with any concerns or feedback so that we can continue to do the best we can for our students.

SUNSMART

Use a combination of 5 sun protection measures

SLIP on clothing
The best barrier between your skin and the sun. Cover as much skin as possible. The tighter the fabric weave, the better the sun protection.

SLOP on sunscreen
SPF50 (or higher) broad-spectrum and water-resistant. Apply 30 minutes before you go outside. Use a generous amount. Reapply every 2 hours. Never rely on sunscreen alone – use all 5 steps for good sun protection! Check expiry date.

SLAP on a hat
Broad-brim to protect the face, head, neck and ears.

SEEK shade
Natural, built or portable, such as marquees and tents.

SLIDE on wrap-around sunglasses
Protect your eyes year-round.

How much sun is enough?

Wet skin is triggered by the sun reaching the skin. It is needed for healthy bones and muscles.

When UV levels are below 3, sun protection is not recommended unless near reflective surfaces such as snow or water for an hour or more.

UV levels above 3 – sun protection is recommended.

Sunscreen use should not put people at risk of vitamin D deficiency.

UV levels

1-2: No protection required. Consider wearing a hat or sunglasses if you are outdoors for an hour or more.

3-11+: Protection recommended. Use a combination of 5 sun protection measures.

Melanoma incidence in Victoria continues to rise, but rates of increase have slowed. There are also falling incidence rates in people under the age of 45.

Skin cancer incidence is higher in men than in women

Think UV not heat. The major cause of skin cancer is overexposure to the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation. UV can't be seen or felt, so it can damage skin without sunburning.

Melanoma is one of the most common cancers diagnosed in Australians aged 15-39 years

Melanoma 35.0% of cancers

Other cancers 65.0%:

- Cervical cancer 2.0%
- Other soft-tissue sarcoma 0.2%
- Breast cancer female 10.0%
- Bladder cancer 0.6%
- Non-Hodgkin lymphoma 1.0%

- Thyroid cancer 1.0%
- Genital gland cancer 1.0%
- Hodgkin lymphoma 0.2%

Equestrian



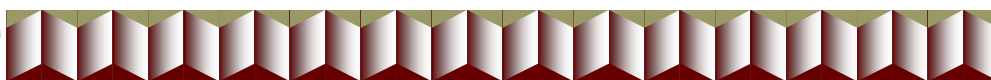

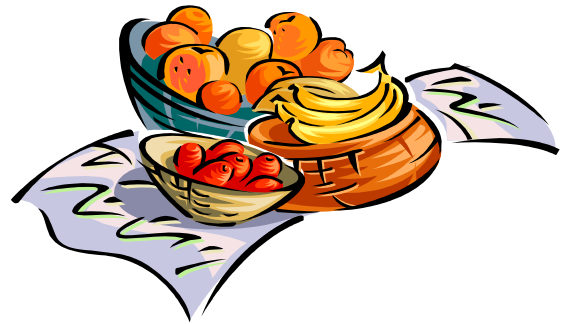
