## From the Principal’s Desk

Students in all three houses listened to motivational speeches from their House Captains in preparation for the CTS athletics carnival to be held at the Cobden Recreational Reserve on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> March. It was great to hear our senior students encouraging our newest students to have a go and do their best. Tandarook have not won the athletics carnival for 10 years and are hungry to knock off Glenfyne who were back-to-back winners in 2021 & 2022. Shenfield were the 2020 champions. The seven-day weather forecast is looking promising. We encourage families to come along and show their support.

**New staff and staffing changes** - Adam Beveridge has commenced teaching in English. Adam has been a longstanding casual relief teacher with us and we're very pleased to have him on our staff. Jenni Wason has started in Administration. We're very pleased to have Jenni on board. New Automotive teacher Darren Russell has commenced as part of the Trade Training Cluster. This has been an excellent outcome after an extensive search to fill this position. We have increased hours for Education Support in the classroom this year. Both Kerri Blain and Kathryn Farmer have increased their time fraction to support student learning. Amanda Camp has been appointed ongoing in Arts/English.

**Key elements of a whole-school approach to attendance:**

- It is important for students to establish positive attendance patterns from the start of the school year.
- Our school will actively encourage and monitor student attendance from the first day of Term 1, 2023.
- Regular attendance is essential to support every child's learning, wellbeing and safety. Every school staff member can play a positive role in encouraging and supporting all students to attend school.

**In general, it is expected that principals would excuse absences for:**

- medical and dental appointments, where out of hours appointments are not possible or not appropriate;
- bereavement or attendance at the funeral of a relative or friend of the student;
- including a student required to attend Sorry Business;
- school refusal, if a plan is in place with the parent to address causes;
- cultural observance, if the parent notifies the school in advance; and
- family holidays, where the parent notifies the school in advance and the student completes any Student Absence Learning Plan agreed by the school, student and parent.

**In general, principals would not be expected to excuse absences, where:**

- approval had not been sought in advance or in accordance with school policy;
- the student was absent due to participating in leisure or social activities without approval;
- the conditions of approval have not been met (for example, Student Absence Learning Plan for a family holiday not completed); and
- the parent has provided no explanation for the absences.

**Buildings and grounds** - We currently have contractors working at the school installing a 50-kilowatt solar power system as part of the State Government Greener Buildings program. We expect this to result in a significant reduction in our electricity bills.

**Personal planners/Uniform:** Personal planners have been introduced and it is great to see so many students consistently use these. In our mentor sessions, students are rewarded for bringing their planners and wearing full school uniform. Using 'Click cards' similar to loyalty card/coffee cards, students gain a click for each day they bring their planner and wear full school uniform. These click cards can then be redeemed for a variety of items, including chocolates, stationary, games, and vouchers.



**Attendance:** Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day. Attending and participating in school will help your child develop:

- important skills and knowledge to help them learn
- social and emotional skills such as good communication, resilience and team work.

Please let the school know as soon as possible and explain why your child can't come to school. Follow up phone calls will be made to families where students have a number of unexplained absences.

**Personal Space:** We have noticed some students have been engaging in play fighting and/or activities where other students' personal space is being impacted. While the vast majority of these occasions are non-malicious in nature, there are times when these occasions can result in injury or misunderstanding. We would like to remind students that the best practice is to keep our hands to ourselves to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all students in the yard.

**Camps:** The year 8 are getting ready for their Summit camp, taking place later in March. Parents, please make sure that you complete the Summit Portal consent, medical and dietary forms. Contact Jen McLennan if you would like some assistance accessing these.

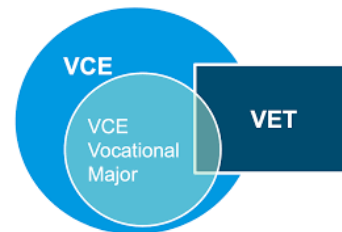


# Teaching & Learning Report

Some Acronyms – VCE – Victorian Certificate of Education:

- VM- Vocational Major
- VPA – Victorian Pathway Certificates
- ILP – Individual Learning Plans
- MYLNS – Middle Years Literacy and Numeracy Supports



This year sees the introduction of the new Senior Secondary Certificate with the key changes being the pathways now called VCE, VCE VM and VPC. For us at CTS this hasn't really affected our students as they already had access to VCE units if they were completing a VCAL pathway and the option of doing a VET. However, this year we have all of our Year 11 Students VCE and VCE VM (traditionally VCAL) completing a VET subject. With some clever timetabling we have managed to minimise the disruptions to their other class and whilst most students take up a subject offered with the Corangamite Trade Training Cluster, we also have students attending South West TAFE in Warrnambool and a TAFE in Geelong studying courses such as Hospitality, Building and Construction, Automotive, Information Technology, Music, Electrotechnology, Animal Studies and Hair and Beauty. It's great to see the students take up this opportunity and we are proud that we have an equal number of VCE and VCE VM students at Year 11 this year.

Across the various subject areas, teachers are working together to check that the student's assessment schedules are being put onto Compass, which means parents and students can check in to see what work students have due in and when it is due or overdue. Teachers have also been focusing upon supporting students to use their planners to be accountable and practice good organisation and time management skills.



In VCE classes teachers are mapping new study designs and also ensuring that their assessments are put on Compass in this instance on the Compass VCE Calendar for all staff and students to see. If students are absent for any assessment task, they require a medical certificate to enable them to sit the task as a scored assessment.

In Maths students are completing their first learning cycle which involves pre and post testing to analyse student growth and staff are working with teachers in small groups at their point of need on their Individual Learning Plans (ILP). In English students have completed the pre tests in Reading and Viewing and Writing as well as pre writing assessments to enable the teachers to work on the skills necessary, whilst they have also begun weekly sessions on their ILP's. Both Literacy and Numeracy classes have tutoring and MYLNS systems in place to support the students that need it most, as identified by the data and teacher observations.

To further support teachers to meet all student needs, Individual Learning Preferences have begun to be posted on student compass chronicles to allow staff, students and parents to access and proactively support student learning in the classroom.

We have teachers attending PD to support students, this week some of the English staff are attending the SoundsWrite PD in Warrnambool, which is an area we identified as a need to improve our skills to support students in spelling, reading and writing. There is also a team of staff attending the Numeracy Professional Learning Community sessions to work together alongside other schools and facilitators to ensure we are improving outcomes in Numeracy whilst supporting staff and engaging students.

Finally, we have also been busy preparing for NAPLAN which will happen at the earlier dates this year. This will allow us to have the results to improve student outcomes sooner. Parent information has been sent home and students will complete these assessments online as scheduled.
