Thank you to all the families that attended the Mentor-Student-Parent conferences on Tuesday 30 January. This was an important day in getting ready for the school year, with the opportunity for families to meet their child's Mentor, and for the sharing of information about the school's expectations regarding uniform, use of electronic devices, hats, and appropriate behaviours, being shared with the student and their family. We see this as critical because we wish to avoid conversations that include 'but I didn't know' as a means of excusing non-compliance with school rules. This is now firmly a part of our start of year procedures, so please bear that in mind later in the year.

With a few days of formal classes already under our belts, our students have already settled in to their new subject loads. Our Year 7 students have commenced a new phase with their entry to secondary school and our Year 12 students are underway in the final phase of their secondary education – the classes of 2023 and 2018 respectively.

This term holds some key rites of passage for both of these groups of students. For our Year 12 students it has been 'game on' since the 2017 upgrade classes, and our students will get explicit support when they attend a study skills day to focus on the skills and the tools they need to prepare for their own success. The Year 7 students can look forward to settling in to the routine and expectations of secondary school. In Week 8, from Wednesday 21 to Friday 23 March, students will be off for three days on the Year 7 camp to get to know each other much better.

And, if that's not busy enough for everyone, we also have the CTS Swimming Carnival on Tuesday 13 February and the CTS Athletics carnival on Thursday 6 March. We expect all students to attend these events as they are part of our normal school program. Being actively involved with others from their House is a great way to feel part of the community, and to mingle with others across the year levels, in support of the House. We encourage families to come along to these days in support of all the students involved in competition.

I hope that, as you look back on the year at some point down the track, you will all feel that what you did in 2018 was of value in building the person you are. To get there, you need to live by the old saying 'don't count the minutes, make every minute count.'

A bit about my role

The role of Assistant Principal is viewed in different ways. Many focus on the discipline aspect, but it is so much more than that. The role involves monitoring and organising the running plan for events such as school photo day, immunisations, and parent-teacher-student interviews. Another key role is in supporting the teaching staff as they work to implement plans to achieve the targets set as part of the school's strategic plan. As Data Manager, I will be planning and scheduling the range of assessments we use to track student progress. In 2018, this will include PAT Testing and on demand testing across Years 7 to 10, and NAPLAN for Year 7 and 9 students. I will also access VCE data to monitor the progress of our cohorts each year. It is this positive side of the role that makes it so rewarding.

This year I am again taking on the role of coordinator for Programs for Students with Disabilities (PSD), and I thank the families with whom I have already met to have a start of year Student Support Group (SSG) meeting. This supports our students with specific learning needs to have clear goals that support their learning. I look forward to meeting other families as we complete the start of year round of SSG meetings.

I will also be meeting with carers/guardians of our few Out of Home Care (OoHC) students for whom we will also have an SSG and set goals to support these students with their learning.

The discipline side is, however, still there in the background. It exists to work through issues created when

students do not live up to the behavioural standards and expectations we have; expectations designed to support learning for all. As parents and carers, I rely strongly on your support in ensuring that your child does their best to arrive at school appropriately equipped and with a positive mindset in relation to the effort they need to make in the classroom.

Sun Smart

Living in Australia, every day, and particularly in the Summer months, is the time to protect your skin and eyes from too much sun.

Research indicates that exposure to the sun while a child has a great impact on the development of skin cancers in later life, so this is an important part of our duty of care to the health and wellbeing of all students. We expect that families will understand and support this important health initiative.

As we take on the responsibility of being a SunSmart school we require that all staff and students follow these 5 SunSmart steps:

- 1. Slip on cool, covering clothing that covers as much skin as possible**
- 2. Slop on SPF 30 or higher broad spectrum sunscreen – make sure you slop on a lot and reapply it every two hours**
- 3. Slap on a hat that shades your face, neck and ears**
- 4. Seek shade – it might be a tree, a verandah or an umbrella**
- 5. Slide on some sunglasses – best to have wrap-around style and labelled AS 1067**

Our staff will model and encourage these behaviours for our students, and students are now required to wear a school approved sun hat when outside during Terms 1 and 4.

The school hat, available at Reicha's, is the only hat accepted as part of our uniform. Hats must provide protection for face, neck and ears, and the bucket hat meets this need while also fitting in with our uniform.

Please be aware that the hat is part of uniform, and as such must remain free of graffiti. Students that deface or damage their hats will be required to replace them with a new hat, so parents please support us in this by reminding your child that the hat is uniform and must remain graffiti free.

Students not wearing a hat while outdoors are required to move out of the sun to the bus shelter, undercover dining area, or a suitable area of permanent shade. Students that refuse such teacher instruction will find that by allowing their behaviour to escalate to that of refusing teacher instructions, their consequence for non-compliance will be more formal.

This is important as part of our duty of care to the health and wellbeing of all students, as research indicates that exposure to the sun while a child has a great impact on the development of skin cancers in later life. We expect that families will understand and support this important health initiative.

UNIFORM

We seek your support as families of students at the school to ensure that correct uniform is worn. When your child does not have the correct uniform, a note should be provided for your child's Mentor (House Group teacher). This will be checked by the Mentor at roll marking, and a uniform pass issued. If, for some reason, your child is repeatedly out of uniform your child's Mentor will make contact with home to discuss what can be done to get your child back into correct uniform.

Shoes must be sturdy and safe for participation in classes, and for this reason, we insist on leather shoes. For girls, lace up shoes have replaced the T-bar shoes that leave too much of the foot uncovered. The wearing of patterned, coloured or hooded clothes under the school polo shirt is not acceptable. We seek your support in ensuring that appropriate plain white singlets or t-shirts are available for your child to wear under their polo shirt for comfort or additional warmth. We hope that everyone understands the simple expectations in relation

to the standard of uniform worn and supports us in having our students look good and learn that clothing standards are a normal part of work life.

While we encourage students to do the right thing, there are consequences for those who choose not to meet the standard expected by the school.

CANTEEN – LUNCH ORDERS

Lunch orders can be made at the canteen during recess. The first ten minutes of lunchtime is allocated for students collecting lunch orders. Likewise, students wishing to have their sandwich toasted can leave it and 20 cents at the canteen at recess time and then collect it at lunchtime.

General shopping commences when lunch orders have been collected, or after the 10 minute window for lunch order collection has passed.

DRINK WATER

Being hydrated helps with thinking and energy levels. As has been the case for a number of years, students are reminded that they are permitted to bring a bottle of water to class. No cordial, no soft drink and no need to leave class for a drink. This helps keep students focused, and in class, for learning.

EXCURSION & CAMPS FORMS

Strict deadlines apply to the return of permission forms and payment for all camps and excursions. If these are not returned on time, students may miss out on the opportunity to attend an event, and events may even be cancelled due to lack of numbers.

We encourage our students to be involved, but cannot take them out of the school for sporting events, excursions and camps if they do not help us by meeting their responsibility in getting forms signed and returned.

INSURANCE

Families please note that the Education Department does not provide personal accident insurance or ambulance cover for students.

Our school's First Aid and Student Safety policies include provision for calling an ambulance should a student have a serious medical need, such as loss of consciousness, anaphylactic reaction, broken limbs, serious joint injuries, and so on.

Parents and guardians of students, who do not have student accident insurance/ambulance cover, are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including the cost of ambulance attendance/transport and any other transport costs. An ambulance fee for family coverage is under \$100 annually, as compared to thousands of dollars if you have to use one.

Parents/guardians can purchase insurance policies from commercial insurers.

Personal property is often brought to school by students, staff and visitors. This can include mobile phones, calculators, toys, sporting equipment and cars parked on school premises. Please note also that the school does not hold insurance for personal property brought to school by students, families or visitors, and it has no capacity to pay for any loss or damage to such property. This is one of the reasons that the school requires students to lock their lockers, and students should not bring any unnecessary or particularly valuable items to school.

Homework

Homework usually involves a range of routine tasks to support students in skill development by providing practice of essential skills, and providing time for tasks not completed at school.

Study is different to homework in that it requires students to look back over lessons and class notes to help consolidate understanding. This may involve re-reading from a text, making note summaries or mind maps, and doing practice exam questions. The focus here is for the student to consolidate their own understanding so that they can tackle tasks with growing independence. This is particularly critical for VCE students in Units 3 and 4 as they work toward SAC tasks and exams.

We encourage all families to talk with their children about their homework and study. Even when there may not be a specific homework task, there is always the study component to consolidate understanding.

UNIFORM ALLOWANCE - YEAR 7

In 2018 every Year 7 government school student who is a recipient of CSEF automatically qualifies to receive a uniform pack that is provided through State Schools' Relief. Please contact the school if you wish to apply for this package.

TAX FILE NUMBER

Students who are 15 years old or above should consider applying for a Tax File Number. Any part time job you have will require you to have a TFN. This is done online by going to the Australian Taxation Office site. There can be quite a wait for this so don't delay, get it done as soon as possible.
